The publication, Common Sense, originally released anonymously, was a 48 page pamphlet that Thomas Paine started writing in 1775 under the title Plain Truth. With the help of Benjamin Rush, the script was edited, polished, and published with the name Common Sense, which Rush also suggested.

Once it was made available to

the public, it became an instant success, initially for its seemingly treacherous content. At the end of its first year in publication, R. Bell, Third Street, Philadelphia, already sold half a million copies and had 25 editions. Thomas Paine donated his earnings from the work to the Continental Army, under George Washington.

The prose was structured in a sermon like approach, with references from the Bible, and it was highly scrutinized by many, including British leaders. Paine wrote the pamphlet as an eye opener to the colonized people of America, which brought a strong, rising revolutionary sentiment towards the colonizers. In the pamphlet, it explicitly divulges

the blame towards the British leader, George III, for the suffering and grief of many colo-Common Sense was nies. written for the sole purpose of advocating an immediate declaration of independence, which indeed was achieved seven months later. The contents discussed the tyrannies involved in the origin and design of the government as well as it critiques the English constitution. It also provided convincing explanations of why America should be separated from Britain.

Common Sense was written in simple, comprehensible language that convinced people of America to fight for its independence and be free from tyranny and the cruelty of British rule.

JANUARY PROGRAM"MOVING VETERANS FORWARD"



Our January Program was given by 25 year Army veteran, Ron Hernandez, who heads up the non-profit organization, "Moving Veterans Forward" Ron discussed his background with the group, what prompted him to start the non-profit, and what his organization does for Omaha veterans.

Ron grew up in South Omaha and followed in the footsteps of his father, a Korea and Vietnam veteran, by joining the Army out of high school.

He was part of the 82nd Airborne and did 2 tours in Bosnia and Kosovo. Later on he served with the 3rd Armored Cavalry Division and served 3 tours in the Anbar Province during the Iraq War. During a mission, Ron's helicopter was shot down outside of Fallujah, Iraq. In the crash, Ron

broke his back, his pelvis, and his leg was so badly injured, it had to be restructured. He was told he would never walk again, and in his words, "being the grunt that I was, that was a challenge to me."

Ron spent a lot of time in the VA system recuperating from his wounds, learning to speak and walk again, and found that the system did not help veterans all the way to the finish line. When they were ready to leave the hospital, they would get them set up in an apartment and "wish them luck". No real support after that, and almost all the veterans had nothing coming out of the hospital, not even a bed to sleep on.

Ron prayed that God would give him a mission and he began helping veterans move into their new locations, with the help of their VA case workers. After about the 8th time helping, Ron realized that this was his mission; to help these veterans move into these locations and get them back on their feet. He created Moving Veterans Forward.

Ron runs the non-profit completely from his pension with the help of volunteers. They have a warehouse in Papillion and they have moved 1240 veterans in their 8 years of existence.

Moving Veterans Forward takes donations of furniture, household supplies, etc. that these veterans can use to get their lives started once again. They have also partnered with Hy-Vee to start Pantry for Patriots. This allows the veteran to get 1 month of groceries when they move in to help get them started on their new life.
