THIS MONTH IN THE REVOLUTION



January 17, 1781—The Battle of Cowpens

"The Bloody Butcher" is what the colonists called British Colonel Banastre Tarlton. He let his dragoons bayonet and hack hundreds of surrendering Americans at Buford's Massacre at the Battle of Waxhaw, 29 May 1780.

In January of 1781, Tarleton led 1200 of Britain's best troops, in a day long, non stop pursuit of American forces. American General, Daniel Morgan, led Tarleton into a trap, at the end of that pursuit, at the Battle of Cowpens. The Americans took a stand at two low hills,

with the Broad
River behind
them, leaving
them no real
means of retreat. Tarleton,
seeing this as a
tactical mistake,
gave into the

temptation of wiping out the American forces, without doing any reconnaissance.

Approaching Cowpens, without letting his fatigued troops rest, after the day long pursuit, Tarleton ordered a head long attack on the American Militia. Morgan had his line fire twice into the oncoming cavalry charge, then retreat back around a hill. Tarleton's dragoons were now at a full gallop, riding right into the American lines.

Tarleton suddenly noticed that behind the militia lines, were 400 battle hardened Continental soldiers, with rifles leveled. The Americans stood, immovable, firing at point blank range. Over 100 British Dragoons were hit and fell from their saddles in the first volley.

Then, the militia that had retreated behind the hill, suddenly appeared from the other side, and hit Tarleton's flank. Tarleton barely escaped. Over 100 British were killed and 830 captured. Captured British officer, Maj. McArthur, of the 71st Highlanders commented that "he was an officer before Tarleton was born; that the best troops in the service were put under 'that boy' to be sacrificed."

The Battle of Cowpens is widely considered a tactical masterpiece, and was the beginning of the end for the British Army. General Cornwallis pursued the Americans, and General Morgan retreated north. Many battles happened along the way, as Morgan and General Nathaniel Greene attempted to link back up with Washington, which culminated with the Americans trapping Cornwallis' Army against the sea, and their ultimate surrender at the Battle of Yorktown.

It is a sad duty to report that we have lost a Compatriot from our ranks.

Compatriot Charles Glen Reynolds, passed away on 15 Jan 2020, after a 3 month battle with aggressive cancer.

Compatriot Reynolds was a descendant of Patriot William Reynolds (MD). He became a member of our Chapter on 15 Feb 2018.

Charles entered the Navy in 1957, and served as an electrician's mate. After serving in the Navy, he worked as an elevator mechanic and a business agent for the union. He leaves behind 3 children and 7 grandchildren. He was also a member of several organizations, including the Sons of the American Revolution, Fort Atkinson Muzzleloaders, Single Action Shooters Association and the Field Club Neighborhood Watch.


