# PROSPECT HILL ADOPT-A-PLOT

Omaha Compatriots,

You should remember that we held a grave marking ceremony, at the gravesite of our first Nebraska SAR President, Champion S. Chase, this past August at Prospect Hill Cemetery in Omaha. We put our own SAR member marker at the gravesite.

Prospect Hill has no budget, so they began the Adopt-A-Plot program to help get volunteers involved in the maintaining of the grounds. With the SAR now having its own marker at the cemetery, the Omaha Chapter has adopted the eastern half of plot 6, which contains our marker next to Compatriot Chase's headstone.

The Spring clean up day, for the whole cemetery, is scheduled for Sunday, May 17. This is currently a tentative date, as is everything, due to the COVID -19 pandemic. We will know more as we get closer to the end of April and see how

#### THIS MONTH IN THE REVOLUTION

#### April 27, 1777

The Battle of Ridgefield took place on April 27, 1777 in Connecticut.

As the British Army was preparing operations to take Philadelphia, General Sir William Howe learned of a large Continental Army depot at Danbury, Connecticut, and instructed Major General William Tryon to raid and destroy it.

The British struck Danbury with 1800 men on the 25th of April, encountering Colonel Joseph P Cooke's small garrison, attempting to move the supplies to a safer location. Tryon attacked and drove off Cooke after a brief skirmish. He then ordered the supplies, largely foodstuffs, uniforms, and other equipment, to be burned.

About 1am, on April 27th, Tryon received word of American forces approaching the town. In order to not be cut off from the coast, he ordered the houses of Patriot supporters in the town burned, and made preparations to depart.

On April 26, word of the enemy reached Major General David Wooster of the Connecticut Militia, and Brigadier General Benedict Arnold at New Haven. Their forces joined with the Fairfield County Militia, Major General Gold Silliman, and moved north toward Redding. Uniting with Silliman, the



American forces numbered about 500 militia and 100 Continental troops. Heavy rain stopped their advance toward Danbury.

Around dawn, Tryon departed Danbury and headed south, with the intention of making the coast through Ridgefield. In an effort to slow the British, and give additional American forces time to arrive, Wooster and Arnold split their forces, with Arnold taking 400 men on to Ridgefield, while Wooster stayed with the rest to harass the enemy's rear. Wooster, catching the British rear off guard, killed 4 and captured 40, in his initial assault. He withdrew and attacked an hour later, this time with Tryon ready with cannon and artillery, and Wooster was mortally wounded.

As the fighting continued in the rear, Arnold and his men worked to build barricades and blockade the streets in town. Tryon attacked about noon, and hit the American positions with artillery, and sent men along the flanks, in hopes to get around the barricades. Silliman anticipated this, and had the flanks blocked.

Seeing that he could not outflank Arnold,

Tryon then sent the weight of his force against the flanks and 600 men straight against the blockades. The artillery managed to break through the flanks, and soon a running battle was underway. Arnold was nearly captured, as his horse was killed and had him pinned between lines.


Arnold and Silliman regrouped, and were supported with militia from New York and Connecticut, as well as Col. John Lamb's Continental Artillery. Arnold established another blocking formation. The militia gave the British lines intense harassment, and Tryon moved his column around causing Arnold to join the militia in pursuit. Even with artillery fire, the Americans could not break the British. Arnold lost another horse and was unable to rally his men for another assault.

The Battle of Ridgefield and the British actions on the Patriot supporters in Danbury, caused much needed support, and army enlistments increased dramatically. The newly raised troops would give General Horatio Gates, much needed support later that year at Saratoga.
